# Continuing Education Noncredit Classes

## Tuition and Fees

**Enrollment Information** - Enrollment in Alliance for Lifelong Learning classes is limited to adults 18 years of age or older except for Youth, GED and high school completion classes, which enroll younger students in accordance with each program's specific age requirements.

**Tuition** - Tuition and fees are as low as operating costs and state law permits and are subject to change without notice. Tuition is the same for both in- and out-of-district residents, and does not include the cost of textbooks or materials. Personal checks are accepted. When providing a check as payment, you authorize the college to either use information from your check to make a one-time electronic fund transfer from your account or to process the payment as a check transaction. A \$25 fee will be applied if your check is returned by the bank.

**Processing Fee** - Registrants will be charged a **\$9 non-refundable processing fee** at the time of registration. However, students who register online at Oakton's web site will only be charged once per semester for an unlimited number of classes. Those registering in person, by mail, or by fax will be charged a \$9 fee with each registration form.

**Cancellation Policy** - If the Alliance cancels a class, registered students will receive a 100 percent tuition refund.

**Refund Policy** - If a student wishes to drop a class, a 100 percent tuition refund **minus a \$15 cancellation fee** will be issued if the student notifies the Alliance office at least five business days prior to the first class session. No refunds will

be issued for requests received less than five business days before the start of class unless authorized at the discretion of the Alliance administrators.

**Residency (In-district Senior Citizens)** - Residents of Oakton's district who are 60 years or older are eligible to receive a senior discount on tuition (unless otherwise indicated). In-district seniors (60+) who register for an Alliance class on or after July 7, 2014 are eligible for a 15 percent tuition discount. In-district seniors who registered before that date will continue to receive a 50 percent discount where applicable. Proof of age and in-district residency must be provided in-person prior to registration.

Acceptable documentation includes: a valid Illinois driver's license or Illinois state ID; or two current bank statements or utility bills. Residency is required 30 days immediately prior to the beginning of the term. Additional proof may be requested at the discretion of the college.

Residents of Oakton's district who are 65 or older whose annual household income is less than the threshold amount provided in Section 4 of the "Senior Citizens and Disabled Persons Property Tax Relief and Pharmaceutical Assistant Act" may enroll without payment of tuition in regularly scheduled "A" coded (i.e. TEC A19-01) courses provided that available classroom space exists and tuition paying students enrolled constitute the minimum number required for the course. Proof of age and a signed declaration of annual income are required at the time of registration. Completion of a waiver request form is necessary with each registration.

## General Information

**Enrollment Verification** - The Alliance does not send confirmation of enrollment. To verify enrollment, go to [www.oakton.edu/conted](http://www.oakton.edu/conted) and select *How to Register*.

**Textbooks** - Textbooks and materials are required for many classes. Costs for these items are not included in the tuition listed. If your classes are at a high school, we recommend that you arrive at least 30 minutes prior to the first class to purchase textbooks at the Alliance site office. Alliance textbooks are not available at the Oakton Community College bookstores.

**Note:** Personal checks and credit cards are not accepted.

##### Montgomery Clift: Mid-Century Method Actor

Fee: \$156

Handsome, tragic Montgomery Clift, one of the original method actors in Hollywood in the 1940s and '50s, often played moody, sensitive young men—the new postwar image of the American male. Join drama critic and author **Doug Deuchler, M.A.**, to screen and discuss eight Clift movies that illustrate his range and versatility. Clift was nominated four times for an Oscar but never won. He led a tormented, troubled life involving addiction to drugs and a lifelong struggle with his sexual orientation. The films screened will range from Alfred Hitchcock's underrated thriller *I Confess* in which Clift plays a young Catholic priest who comes under suspicion for murder, to *The Search*, set in postwar Germany. In that remarkable movie, Clift is an American private trying to help a lost Czech boy who'd been in Auschwitz, find his mother. The film line-up will also include *Red River*, *The Heiress*, *A Place in the Sun*, *From Here to Eternity*, *Suddenly*, *Last Summer*, and *The Misfits*.

Barbara Stanwyck was one of Golden Age Hollywood's hardest-working and most talented actresses. Film noir—those dark, crime-driven movies that emerged from Hollywood after World War II from the mid-1940s through the early 1950s continue to enjoy unabated popularity. This class explores the many film noir “ingredients” such as a menacing city at night, an atmosphere of paranoia, a desirable but dangerous woman, a gullible and morally weak man, and an inescapable crime of passion. The films will range from *Crossfire* ('47) in which a man is murdered by an anti-Semitic bigot, to *Sudden Fear* ('52) in which an ambitious actor marries a successful older woman playwright, then plots to murder her. The six movies screened include work by directors Nicholas Ray, Fritz Lang, Max Ophuls, and Edward Dmytryk with popular stars including Robert Ryan, Joan Crawford, Ida Lupino, James Mason, Gloria Grahame, and Glenn Ford.
